True Freedom - Accept No Substitutes

Galatians 1:6-10

I am astonished that you are so quickly deserting the one who called you by the grace of Christ and are turning to a different gospel-- which is really no gospel at all. Evidently some people are throwing you into confusion and are trying to pervert the gospel of Christ. But even if we or an angel from heaven should preach a gospel other than the one we preached to you, let him be eternally condemned! As we have already said, so now I say again: If anybody is preaching to you a gospel other than what you accepted, let him be eternally condemned! Am I now trying to win the approval of men, or of God? Or am I trying to please men? If I were still trying to please men, I would not be a servant of Christ.

Snake oil, homeopathic remedies, blood-letting... From days of old, miracle cures of all kinds have been offered for every ailment that exists. With a mixture of alchemy, fragments of scientific truth, and often a great deal of superstition, people such as Samuel Hahnemann (1755-1843) the German physician who is considered to be the father of homeopathy, to Mary Baker Eddy (1821-1910) the founder of the Christian Science religion, who denied that disease exists at all, there are always those who will offer cures and antidotes to anyone who is desperate.

But rarely, if ever, do those remedies work. At best they are nothing but placebos, substances that promise a certain effect, and therefore, by the power of suggestion, seemingly produce the desired result in the health of the hopeful person who takes them. But they actually do nothing to cure or prevent diseases or other maladies.

There are all kinds of fake cures and remedies out there. This is doubly true when it comes to spiritual things. In the religious world we are offered all kinds of remedies for sin, all sorts of solutions for the questions we have about salvation and eternal life. But all of them are fake; all of them, that is, except for one... the Gospel of Jesus Christ. It alone can offer us peace with God and the cure for the spiritual illness called sin. It alone is the true Good News of salvation. Accept no substitutes. There is no other Gospel.

The book of Galatians is probably the oldest of St. Paul's Biblical letters dating back to somewhere around the year A.D. 50. But going back even that far, only about 20 years after Jesus' resurrection, already there were false prophets who were trying to teach that salvation was attained by works and not by faith in Christ alone. The false prophets were called the Judaizers. They deceived many people. Therefore Paul wrote to the Galatians: **I am astonished that you are so quickly deserting the one who called you by the grace of Christ and are turning to a different gospel-- which is really no gospel at all.**

How quickly it was that the Galatians, who had escaped the slavery of the devil by the Good News about Jesus, had once again become enslaved by the liar. They attempted to return to the law as a means of salvation.

But this is the problem we all have as sinners. There is a part of all of us, a sinful nature, which wants us to believe that we are saved by what we do. It is the devil's work. It takes hold of our sinful pride and says, yes, you have to believe in Jesus as your Savior, but you also have to make your life right with God before he accepts you. You have to get everything in order before you can be worthy to stand in his presence. Thus we mix false teachings with the truth of God's word.



But the Gospel teaches that God saved us; we did nothing to save ourselves. The difference between Christianity and every other religion is that every other religion teaches we are saved by what we do for God or for ourselves. Christianity, on the other hand, teaches that God saved us purely by his grace and not because of anything we have done or can do.

We are tempted daily to mix Christianity with elements of the work righteous religion of the devil. We become like the Israelites of old who worshiped the LORD, but who also compromised by making a golden calf, and later tried to integrate elements of Baal worship and other idolatrous practices with the worship of the true God.

Paul had to warn the Galatians, as he warns us today, not to mix the truth with error. Use the Gospel pure and full strength.

How many of us, if we have a headache or some other problem, take a half dose of Tylenol and try to supplement what is lacking by also swallowing a couple of marshmallows or a sugar cube? Like trying to take lemon drops to cure diabetes is the person who accepts watered-down doctrines and thinks he is making himself better spiritually. But that is what happens whenever we try to mix false teachings with the truth of the Gospel.

Sadly, many of the books we read, written by authors outside of our circles, and many of the sermons we hear by radio and television evangelists, both the evangelicals or reformed preachers, often mix the true Gospel of Jesus Christ with teachings such as decision theology, work-righteousness, the denial of the Gospel in Baptism and the Lord's Supper as the Means of Grace. They teach millennialism, confusion of Law and Gospel, and the idea of positive thinking as a substitute for the doctrine of justification by God's grace alone through faith in Jesus Christ. But there is no other Gospel than the one which Paul prescribes here. It must be used

pure and full strength, not mixed with other teachings, not even the law. For even the Law, which is God's word, is not intended to save us, but only to show us our sin.

Paul even went so far as to say: **But even if we or an angel from heaven should preach a gospel other than the one we preached to you, let him be eternally condemned!** When we think of other religions such as Islam or Mormonism, we recall how the founders of those religions claimed that angels appeared to them to give them revelations which contradicted the Gospel of Christ. We need only to refer back to what Paul forewarned. The devil comes as an angel of light pretending to be a servant of God, offering to us, as he did to Adam and Eve in the Garden, something which he claims is better than what God has given to us. But his deceitful offers always undermine the truth and bring shame and destruction. Paul warns us to shun his lies and know that the devil and his false teachers are bound for eternal punishment in hell.

However, the Gospel of Christ always heals, always forgives, always grants life and imparts truth. It delivers from Satan, death and hell. Therefore Paul teaches us to embrace it by faith and to leave our salvation in the hands of a loving God who sent his Son to live and die in our place to pay the debt for our sins, and to grant us eternal life in the presence of our loving Father who reconciled us to himself in Jesus our Savior.

During this month when we celebrate our civic freedom as a nation, may we also be reminded of the greater freedom that is ours in Christ. Having been set free from the slavery of sin, we are at liberty to live to the glory of our gracious God. He is the One and Only. May we never accept any substitute.

Layman's Report of Minnesota District WELS Convention

I wish to express my sincere thank you to St. John's for selecting me to be the layman delegate to the 50th Biennial Convention of the Minnesota District. I truly consider it a privilege to be able to serve in this capacity. I pray that I represented you well.

The theme of "Thanking God for our Lutheran Heritage" was carried out well throughout the three days. A number of speakers addressed the convention, including Minnesota District President Charles Degner who gave his President's Report. We also heard from Pastor Jeff Limpert—who gave a presentation on "What Does It Mean to Be Confessional," Pastor Jonathan Brohn—who gave a presentation on "What Does It Mean to be Evangelical," and Pastor Chris Cordes—who gave a presentation on "What Does It Mean to Be Missional." We also received updates from various organizations within the Wisconsin Synod, including home missions, parish schools, adult discipleship, world missions, youth discipleship, and WELS Christian Aid and Relief. We also heard an update on the WELS Hymnal Project.

Each delegate to the convention is asked to serve on a committee. I was assigned to serve on the Resolutions Committee. We presented the convention with two

reports and six resolutions. The resolutions were presented to ratify delegates, conference officers, circuit pastors, and district officers. We also offered a resolution to thank Pastor Don Sutton for his years of service on the District Presidium (he chose not to run for re-election).

Elections were held. Among those elected were:

There were several worship opportunities throughout the convention as well. We began the convention with a communion service in the Chapel of the Christ. Pastor Benjamin Blumer gave the sermon and Pastor John Boeder was the Presiding Minister. Other devotions included the topics: the Ten Commandments, the Creed, the Lord's Prayer, the Sacrament of Holy Baptism, and the Keys and Confession.

Wisconsin Lutheran College

The Wisconsin Lutheran College has a central location on the border of Milwaukee and suburban Wauwatosa, Wisconsin. It is located across the street from the Milwaukee Regional Medical Center where students can take advantage of the area's beautiful lakefront, cultural offerings, and internships at Fortune 500 companies.

2. Care personally for students in a distinctive, Christ-centered environment. Students are mentored by caring, Christian faculty and staff. Students have volunteer programs in which they share their faith and serve others. Students can compete in NCAA Division III athletics or take part in more than 45 clubs and organizations.
3. Provide a welcoming campus in a vibrant community filled with opportunity. There are modern residence halls and state of the art facilities.
4. Offer exceptional value at a competitive cost. Students received more than \$12 million in scholarships this year and will graduate with the second-lowest debt load among private colleges in Wisconsin. According to College Factual, the college ranks 47th in the nation among colleges that deliver a great education compared to their cost.
5. Prepare students for lives of Christian servant leadership. Communities, workplaces, families, and churches desperately need moral, ethical, and Christian leaders. Preparing students to be these leaders in the world is a key component of the college's mission.

New Teacher/ASC Director

Mr. Aaron Schleusener received a call to Great Plains Lutheran High School during the last week of school. After deliberation, he accepted the new call and will be leaving our faculty. Continue to keep the Schleusener family in your prayers as they make the transition to Watertown, SD.

The BOCD met and discussed the options for filling Mr. Schleusener's call. A recommendation to go to the Assignment Committee was passed on to the Church Council/Congregation. On Sunday, June 19th, St. Paul's congregation voted to go to the Assignment Committee for a graduate. On Monday, June 20th, the Assignment Committee assigned Mr. Nicholas Kressin, a December - 2015 MLC graduate to serve in grades 5&6 as well as serving as school athletic director. Nick lives in New Ulm and is married to the former Heather Danell, a lead teacher in the MLC Early Childhood Center.

Mrs. Malory Eckstrand received a Call to teach PreK and some K-3 classes in Hutchinson, MN. After deliberation she accepted that call. The Summer Care program is being run by current lead teachers in the program. The position for After School Care Administrator for the 2016-17 school year will be made available through application. There will be more information in the bulletin.

Building Project

Although the main entry phase was postponed, St. Paul's members voted to begin the Handicapped Bathroom portion of the building project. There has been some preliminary plumbing work done, but the demolition and construction of walls is anticipated to begin June 27th. Watch the bulletin for details of Summer Care and other school activities as they may be affected by construction.

The construction of the new road from Garden Street into the St. Paul's School parking lot made a move of current playground necessary. Using the current playground fund balance of \$31,000 and funds from a gift given to St. Paul's School to be used for school equipment, St. Paul's will be constructing a new playground area with additional new apparatus between the baseball field and the new road at the south end of the school property. The wooden playground equipment was recommended to the Board of Properties to be removed due to safety issues. A new playground area to replace this structure will wait until new building construction is planned and become part of the building project.

Although the construction of the main phases was delayed until next spring, the building campaign continues to build up funds for the coming construction. Please continue to fill any previous commitments so that the Building committee can make plans for construction in spring of 2017. Continue to keep this project in your prayers and consider giving regular gifts to support this project.

Registration

Registration will most likely take place at St. Paul's Parish Center rather than the school due to the Bathroom Construction. Information will be given in bulletins prior to registration. Watch for Details.

Registration Packets will be prepared for parents in mid-July; they will be mailed out to give parents time to go through them before Registration Day. Registration Day will be held on Thursday, August 4th with two sessions, 10:00 to 2:00 and 4:00 to 7:00. Lifetouch will be taking School yearbook and ID pictures- these are important for the school lunch program. A form for ordering personal pictures will be included in the Registration Packet.

School Start

School is scheduled to begin on Tuesday, August 30, with an Opening Service in the gymnasium. There will be no school on Friday, September 2nd or Labor Day, September 5th.

A new addition to the library is titled "Meditations for the New Mother." It was written by Helen G. Brenneman. In "Hello - My Name is Single" by Adriane Heins, the author treats singleness as a godly vocation which may or may not be permanent. The sub-title of this book is "How I Learned to Ignore the Worlds Expectations and Trust God." She feels the single Christian is often ignored by the church family. She reminds those who are single that the Lord's plan for you may be different than the one you imagined for yourself. She includes in her definition of being single those who are single by choice or divorce.

Added to the Biblical Theology section of the library are the two volumes called "Lutheran Bible

Companion" published by Concordia Publishing House. The first volume contains an introduction and an explanation of the books of the Old Testament. Volume 2 tells of the intertestamental era, an explanation of the books of the New Testament, and a Bible dictionary.



- The annual joint outdoor worship service at German Park co-sponsored by St. John's and St. Paul's will be held on Saturday, July 9, at 6:30 pm.
- The Board of Elders has begun to prepare for the extension of a call to replace Pastor Laitinen when he retires at the end of the calendar year. Position descriptions for our pastors in their respective roles are being reviewed and preparations are being made for a congregational assessment conducted by a member of the Minnesota District presidium in the months prior to the call meeting. The current plan is to extend the first call during the month of October with a prayer that the position will be filled early in the new year.

- The council approved a recommendation to transfer \$50,517 from the Estate Fund to cover the home operations deficit from 2015, reducing the fund balance by almost one-third. Since this type of action cannot be sustained over a period of several years without depleting the fund, the recommendation will be brought to the July 26 voters' meeting for consideration and ratification. This action does not affect the home operations deficit for the first five months of 2016, which stands at almost \$65,000.

- Trustee David Rausch reported that additional parking lot lighting has been installed. The summer list of projects includes patching the basement floor paint and replacing a handicap sign that was damaged in the parking lot.

- Pastor Bovee reported that the Bible study series on the doctrine of fellowship held on Sundays during the month of June with special application to the fellowship policy in place at Minnesota Valley Lutheran High School has been well attended.

- The Church Council does not meet in July; the next regular meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, August 21.

Miscellany

Some more items from service bulletins, newsletters, and council and congregational minutes from 60, 50, 25, 10, and 1 years ago. Hope you will find them interesting. Comments, questions, suggestions and even corrections are welcome.

1956, Pastor was Rollin Reim. August: "Our Joint Synod will convene in Watertown for the purpose of acting on the matter of our fellowship relations with the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod." A special discussion meeting was scheduled to hear the resolutions. *Note: no copy of those resolutions seem to exist in the archives.*

1966, Pastor was Frederick Nitz. Beginning in May Sunday bulletins included not only progress reports on offerings but on building progress: arrival of materials and foundation for the tower, roof trusses and stone laid (June), roof decking (Aug), interior work beginning (Sept), furnishings arrived and installed (Nov), and many other details. Corner stone laying took place on June 19 along with a picnic at DMLC.

1991, Pastors were Norval Kock and David Kolander (as of Aug); **David Zabel was Director of Christian Education.** June 30 and following service

folders refer to special blue envelopes for offerings to a reserve account to provide for a sort of savings account when operating funds are short of meeting expenses. In August the congregation decided to pursue the establishment of an endowment fund.

2006, Pastors were Jeffrey Bovee and Wayne Laitinen; Administrative Teacher was James Dretske. It was reported in July that there was a problem with bats in the belfry. Solving the problem was a bit complicated: estimated cost \$10,800. Fortunately it included a warranty since a bat was seen in December.

2015, Pastors were Jeffrey Bovee and Wayne Laitinen; Administrative Teacher was James Dretske. The congregation approved service time changes for mid-week Advent and Lent services: to two services at 4 pm and 6 pm, eliminating the 7 pm service.
