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## IT'S SUMMER AGAIN

**Genesis 8:20-22** Then Noah built an altar to the LORD and, taking some of all the clean animals and clean birds, he sacrificed burnt offerings on it. <sup>21</sup> The LORD smelled the pleasing aroma and said in his heart: "Never again will I curse the ground because of man, even though every inclination of his heart is evil from childhood. <sup>22</sup> And never again will I destroy all living creatures, as I have done. <sup>22</sup> "As long as the earth endures, seedtime and harvest, cold and heat, summer and winter, day and night will never cease."

Wow, it sure is hot and humid out there, isn't it? Those are the kinds of things we hear and say this time of year. Of course, when winter comes, we will complain about how cold it is. It's a part of living in the Midwest. Changes in the seasons bring with them weather conditions, with periods of light and darkness, indicative of those times of year. In fact, we would find it more than odd to have snow in July or August, or to have 90 degree temperatures in January. We learn to expect the changes in the seasons.

But as the seasons change, do we always remember that God promised it would be so? Noah and his family, after having drifted for over seven months, and then having waited another five, stepped off the Ark. Noah built an altar to the LORD, and sacrificed burnt offerings on it. These offerings indicated total dedication to God and were used as a means showing complete trust in the promises he had fulfilled to Noah and his family.

Now, if you have ever smelled burning hair and feathers, you might say it is not the most pleasant aroma in the world. However, when God smelled Noah's offerings, the Bible tells us: **The LORD smelled the pleasing aroma...**

The aroma was pleasing to God, even though it was offered by a sinful man who shortly afterwards would get drunk and make a shameful spectacle of himself in front of his sons. It was pleasing and acceptable to God because it was connected to the promise God had made to Noah and his family. God had promised to deliver them, not only from the waters of the flood, but from the sinful, unbelieving world around them. And also, as the writer of the book of Hebrews tells us: By faith Noah, when warned about things not yet seen, in holy fear built an ark to save his family. By his faith he condemned the world and became heir of the righteousness that comes by faith (Hebrews 11:7). Noah preserved the promise of the coming Savior who would justify the human race by his righteous life and innocent death in our place.

Noah, by faith, did as the LORD had commanded him. His offerings to God given by faith were pleasing to God, since they embraced the gracious promises of God and hallowed God's name to give him the glory.

As a result, the Bible says, **God ...said in his heart: "Never again will I curse the ground because of man, even though every inclination of his heart is evil from childhood. And never again**

will I destroy all living creatures, as I have done. "As long as the earth endures, seedtime and harvest, cold and heat, summer and winter, day and night will never cease."

As the seasons change, we are reminded that we, sinners even from childhood, are the recipients of this gracious promise from God. Summer is still hot, and winter is still cold, but more important than that, God promises to be merciful. He withholds the destruction which we really deserve, and shows us mercy. God desires all sinners to repent and trust in his forgiveness and salvation.

Many years after the Flood, God would send his only Son, Jesus Christ, who would deliver the human race from all sin. Jesus would be our substitute in life by living a perfect life in our place. He would be our sacrifice in death by dying to take the punishment we deserved for our sin. He would pay our debt to God, and by his offering, he would make us a pleasing aroma to God. He would invite us to the waters of baptism, which are prefigured by the Flood, and wash us clean in the gospel promise of his forgiveness.

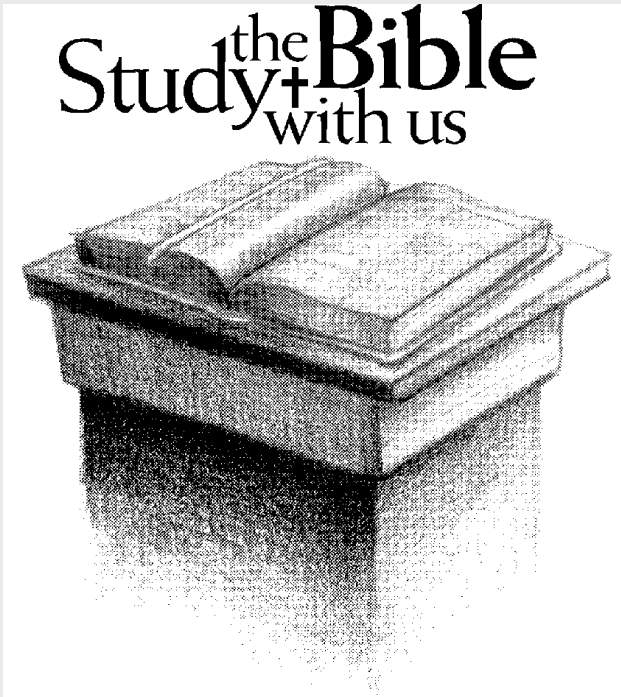
We see in the heat of summer and the ripening grain of the coming harvest, that God fulfills his promises. And as we see his promise fulfilled, let us be reminded that in the change of the seasons there is a greater promise. God, in his mercy, does not give us the punishments we deserve, and in his grace he gives us blessing we do not deserve. He forgives us in Christ and has made us acceptable and pleasing to him. By faith, may we therefore offer to God all we are and have, knowing that in Christ we are an offering, pleasant and aromatic to our Lord. To sinners such as we he has granted pardon, peace, and eternal life because he never goes back on his promises.

## Your Synod at Work

### Reformation 500 Committee

A Reformation 500 Committee was appointed by WELS President Mark Schroeder in 2009 for the purpose of guiding the celebration of the 500th anniversary of the Reformation. The anniversary year is coming up in 2017. Although we have already mentioned this committee in a previous column, we thought it might be worthwhile to review the work of the Reformation 500 Committee again.

The Committee set two goals when they began their plans: (1) no funds were to be used that would take money away from the ongoing ministry of the synod (projects would have to be funded in other ways), and (2) the celebration of the Reformation would be an opportunity to educate WELS and others on the important truths the Reformation brought to light.

A logo was developed to serve as a visual identity for the celebration. The logo is available for individual congregation, conference, and district events and publications. Encouragement was also given to districts to begin planning for their conventions by choosing Reformation themes. The purpose was to encourage those gatherings and not directly plan them.

While the Committee was doing their work, they established a third goal: To use the celebration of the Reformation as an opportunity to share the gospel with the communities that surround our congregations.

The Committee believes that the focus of our celebration should include reaching out to those who do not share an appreciation for the gospel that we treasure. The Committee encourages local congregations to use the anniversary as an opportunity to share Christ with their own communities. Therefore, together with the Board for Home Missions and the Commission on Evangelism resources are being developed for each congregation to reach out with special services and information geared to those on their prospect lists.

A webpage is also being created to be a source for all things Reformation 500. The webpage will highlight the books and materials when they become available. Also, resources for use by congregations will be available on the site to download. Information regarding rallies and other gatherings in the districts of the synod will be posted for easy reference.

# St. Paul’s Lutheran School

**BoCD Work** (SP Board of Child Discipleship)

**New Teacher** Mr. Nick Kressin with wife, Heather (Danell) has officially begun his ministry work at St. Paul’s School. He has met several times with the 5<sup>th</sup> & 6<sup>th</sup> grade level to help prepare for the new school year. He is excited and looking forward to beginning his ministry here in New Ulm. Please keep him and all the St. Paul’s Staff in your prayers.

**Kindergarten** Thirty-one students have signed up for kindergarten at this point. Members who may have not yet registered should get their registration in. Enrollment is expected to dip slightly in the 2016-17 school year with the number at about 277 at this point for K-8 (St. John’s -93 students (up from 88)– 33.6%) (35 non-member students – 7 other WELS). The number last reported for PreK is 36 students. Ms. Nikki Steenbock will continue to help out with the morning sessions of Pre-K which are over the 10 student limit for a teacher. Online registration forms are available for a few open afternoon spots.

**Facility Improvements** Several building improvements and classroom purchases either have been completed or are being planned. The plans include the replacement of carpeting in Mrs. Grunwald’s and Mr. Kressin’s classrooms; purchase a few new Chrome-book Computers for grades 7-8 to replace older models; tables were also purchased replace the old tablet desks in the lecture room (partial After School Care purchase). The gym received additional coatings of finish appropriate for the year following the new update. The old Wooden Structure Play area was torn out and a new structure will be constructed on the southern portion of our property. It will be just north of the new road that is being put in. A fence will eventually be constructed to separate the play area from the road. The cost of the new play structure, installation, and landscaping came to over \$71,000. The playground fund of over \$31,000 will be used for the playground as well as an Estate gift earmarked for school equipment. St. Paul’s School hopes to use a variety of events such as the Amazing Race in August to raise funds to replenish some of the funds to be used for future equipment needs. The installation of the playground is anticipated shortly after school begins.

The first work under the umbrella of New Building Construction has begun. Handicapped Bathrooms are being completed on both the first and second floors. Although not completed, the bathrooms are scheduled

to be completed before the school year begins on August 30. The new road which will serve as an additional exit for our people is underway. It is also hoped to be completed in time for the school year to begin.

**After School Care Director** Applications are being sought for the After School Care Program Director. Please call the school office at 507-354-2329 if you are interested in finding out more about the position. Mrs. Eckstrand took her call to Hutchinson to teach PreK with additional classes for K-2. We hope to have a new director in place for the start of the new school year.

**Tuition Assistance** Following the June 30 deadline for submitting assistance applications at St. Paul’s School, the T-A Committee met to distribute funds available. Tuition assistance grants were awarded to 17 families (41 children). Eight families benefited from the policy that allows the fourth and any additional children to enroll tuition free. Grants from various assistance funds totaled \$17,170.

**Registration** will take place on **Thursday, August 4<sup>th</sup>** and includes Lifetouch school pictures for students and staff. - **10:00 am-2:00 pm** and **4:00 pm-7:00 pm AT ST. PAUL’S CHURCH, PARISH CENTER.**

The 2016-17 school year will begin on Tuesday, Aug. 30<sup>th</sup> for grades 1-8 following the Opening service at about 8:20. Kindergarten will begin on Wed., Aug.31<sup>st</sup>. There will be no school on Friday, September 2<sup>nd</sup> nor Monday Sept. 5<sup>th</sup> for a Labor Day weekend break.

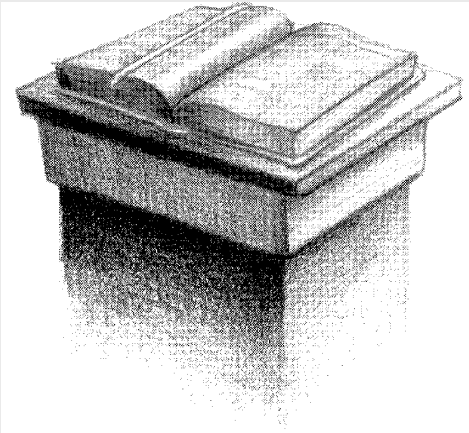

#### The Second Quarter Meeting of the St. John’s Voters

Eighteen voters were present on Tuesday evening, July 26, to consider reports from the various boards and a recommendation from the church council. The following recommendation from the council was ratified by the voters: “Transfer an amount of \$50,517 from the Estate Funds to cover the home operations deficit for 2015.” This action was taken in spite of reservations expressed by both council members and the voters. It will reduce the balance in the Estate Funds to about \$130,000. Although similar action has been taken in the past, the continuing use of Estate Funds to cover ongoing operational expenses is not sustainable in the long term. It also hampers the ability of the congregation to use these funds in the future for special purposes, such as facility needs. Although not their intended purpose, these special funds also serve as a source for internal borrowing in situations like this, allowing our treasurer to pay the salaries of our called workers and keep the lights on in our worship complex when weekly offerings fall short of our needs.

Unfortunately, the action taken by the voters is only a partial solution to the financial deficit faced by the congregation. Reports from the treasurer and financial secretary at the voters’ meeting showed that through the first 6 months of 2016, expenditures have exceeded receipts by almost \$70,000. This deficit will be on the minds of the church council as it begins preparation of the 2017 congregational budget later this month.

It was encouraging to read in the Sunday bulletin for the weekend of July 23-24 in the “fruits of faith” report that congregational gifts for the previous week had actually exceeded the weekly need. However, the same report the following week was more typical with gifts covering less than 60% of the need. While this is a small sample size and there can be many reasons for the fluctuation, the large deficits recently faced by the congregation are an indication that, in general, receipts are not keeping pace with expenses.

If St. John’s were a business, we would be examining our business model and looking for ways to increase revenue or curtail expenses as a way of balancing the budget. As an arm of ministry, Pastor Bovee’s recent sermon on Luke 12:13-21 provides a better approach for our congregation. The Luke account finds Jesus telling a parable about a young man faced with the dilemma of what to do with his abundant wealth. Jesus used the parable to remind his listeners that spiritual riches are more important than the accumulation of earthly riches. The St. John’s voters adopted the current budget with the confidence that, under God and by his blessing, it would support the gospel outreach of the congregation within our community and as partners in the work being done by our Wisconsin Evangelical Lutheran Synod. Knowing that Jesus has made the ultimate sacrifice for our sins, may we be motivated to respond with gifts of love to support the work he has directed us to do. Whether it is attending a voters’ meeting, reaching out to a neighbor in need, serving on a board or committee, bringing our first fruit offerings or any of the other countless opportunities for service he has placed before us, may we be truly rich in Christ.

Like previous months, some more items from service bulletins, newsletters, and council and congregational minutes from 60, 50, 25, 10, and 1 years ago. Hope you will find them interesting. **1956**, Pastor was Rollin Reim. Various Young Peoples Society activities were reported during the year. A “winter frolic,” skating and tobogganing at Garden Street Park (Feb.). An excursion trip to Rochester including Sunday services at a new mission congregation and visits to “some of the scenic wonders of the territory” including the Crystal Caves (July). An outing labeled “they-know-not-where” including a “heartly feed” with a reminder to “wear warm hiking clothes” (Oct.).

**1966**, Pastor was Frederick Nitz. The dedication of the superstructure took place on December 11. A report in the December 25 service folder noted that total cost would appear to remain within the estimate of \$160,000.

**1991**, Pastors were Norval Kock and David Kolander (as of Aug); David Zabel was Director of Christian

Education. The May Newsletter included the following from a report by Prof. Roland Hoenecke: “Happy Anniversary Archives!” noting that it had been five years since the establishment of an archives collection. Prof. Hoenecke was the archivist. Thanks to him for the material for these articles. Suggestions for a name for the monthly newsletter were requested—the beginning of the Fortress.

**2006**, Pastors were Jeffrey Bovee and Wayne Laitinen; Administrative Teacher was James Dretske. The September Board of Trustees report noted that storage rooms housed lots of “stuff” which suggested work for an archivist. Bob Krueger volunteered to work on this if room could be found to do the work. The rest is history. Room for file cabinets and the “stuff” were provided in the balcony storage room.

**2015**, Pastors were Jeffrey Bovee and Wayne Laitinen; Administrative Teacher was James Dretske. Christian Walz, a Bethany Lutheran Seminary student served his early field experience at St. John’s by way of serving as the lead Bible class teacher and conducting the confirmation class.
