A NEW BEGINNING RENEWED IN CHRIST

2 Corinthians 4:16-18 Therefore we do not lose heart. Though outwardly we are wasting away, yet inwardly we are being renewed day by day. ¹⁷ For our light and momentary troubles are achieving for us an eternal glory that far outweighs them all. ¹⁸ So we fix our eyes not on what is seen, but on what is unseen. For what is seen is temporary, but what is unseen is eternal.

Welcome to the New Year. It's a sort of special time because we regard it as an opportunity to have a new beginning, as if everything can start over fresh and renewed.

Of course, the reality of it is that many of the old problems are really not left behind. They tend to follow us wherever we go, even into the New Year. The debts, the hard feelings, the illnesses, all have a way rearing their ugly heads again. For sinners such as we, grudges, sicknesses, sorrows, and creditors are not so easily shaken. They tend to continue to taunt and harass us even though we attempt to ignore them and pretend, for at least a brief moment, that they aren't really there anymore.

Thankfully these problems are all temporary. In fact, the greatest problem in our lives, the one which incurred the greatest debt, inflicted the most painful wounds, and was the heaviest burden we had to bear, has in reality been taken off our shoulders. We do not have to pretend at all; it is really all gone. For the burden which brought every painful problem upon us has now been taken away for us by our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

Jesus Christ has taken away our sin. He removed the guilt that weighed us down. Not just the feelings of guilt, which Martin Luther referred to as regret. All of us have regret over things we did wrong in the past and wish we could undo. Those are only guilt feelings. We all have such remorse. Feelings and emotions are never a good gauge to determine whether we have a right relationship with God nor can we be sure we are forgiven because we can sense it.

No, Jesus took away the real guilt, that is, the sin that condemned us before God and separated us from him. When Jesus died on the cross, his perfect sacrifice paid the real debt for our real sin. What is more, his perfect righteousness really counts for all of us. Through faith in Jesus we are declared innocent in God's sight.

St. Paul reminds us that it had nothing to do with us. He wrote: Therefore we do not lose heart. Though outwardly we are wasting away, yet inwardly we are being renewed day by day. ¹⁷ For our light and momentary troubles are achieving for us an eternal glory that far outweighs them all. ¹⁸ So we fix our eyes not on what is seen, but on what is unseen. For what is seen is temporary, but what is unseen is eternal.

Although we cannot see them with eyes of flesh, we see God's eternal blessings and embrace his gracious promises by faith. Even in the midst of trial and pain we can know that Jesus Christ, our Savior, is our Redeemer who has freed us from Satan's power, and promises we have right relationship with God, our Heavenly Father.

The Prophet Jeremiah wrote in the book of Lamentations that God's mercies are new every morning. With each new day we can look out at the sunrise and realize we have a new beginning with God in Christ, for the slate of sin has been wiped clean by his blood. It is Jeremiah who also reminds us that God remembers our sin no more.

For the Christian, it is more than just wishful thinking that we have a new beginning in 2016. It is not because of the turn of the year on the calendar, but because in Christ we are made new and are able to start all over again. We are renewed, and made a new creation in Christ our Lord. May this promise enable us to live in joyful service to the glory of his holy name in the year to come.

Those Who Served

Over the years St. John's has held elections just like our government does but with a different purpose. Though this article may just be names, it might also bring back some special memories and indicate some changes in the organization of the congregation. Their service was important to the history of St. John's

The 1955 Annual Report names William Brei as Moderator and the following as members of the Church Council: Fred Nieno, Chairman and Deacon; Herbert Bade, Secretary; Don Engel, Treasurer; Paul Vorwerk, Financial Secretary, Ervin Reiner, Trustee Chairman; Henry Wacker, and Maynard Beilke as Trustees.

1965: Pastor, Frederick Nitz. Alvin Rolloff was Moderator; John Oldfield, Secretary; Arthur Gronholz, Treasurer; Henry Baumann, Financial Secretary; Howard Kaiser, Arnold Koelpin, and Edwin Bauermeister served as Elders; Elvin Stoering, Roland Mehlberg and Otto Wacker as Trustees; and Elmer Kitzrow as Deacon.

1990: Pastor, Norval Kock; David Zabel, Director of Christian Education. Rodney Karnitz, Howard Wessel, Dennis Jasperson, Robert Johnson, David Stoering, John Paulsen, John Moldenhauer, Charles Enter, Steven Fenske and Gerald Yanz served,

respectively as President, Vice President, Secretary, Financial Secretary, Treasurer, Deacon and Chairs of the Boards for Stewardship, of Education, Trustees, and Evangelism.

2005: Pastors, Jeffrey Bovee and Wayne Laitinen; Administrative Teacher, James Dretske. Serving on the Church Council were officers: President, Steven Thiesfeldt; Vice President, Kevin Doering; Secretary, Roger Hermanson; Treasurer, Wayne Wels and Financial Secretary, Jim Grunwald. John Paulsen served as Deacon, Philip Leyrer as Stewardship Chair, John Boeder as Youth and Education Chair, Rod Karnitz as Trustees Chair, Bob Mielke as Evangelism Chair, and Darvin Raddatz as Elders Chair.

For **2015** and for **2016** you may refer to the Annual Report.

Many others also served over the years as members of boards and committees, ushers, officers and leaders of other organizations and in other less official capacities. Some names will appear in future articles. Over the years some names reoccur for various offices and positions. Maybe sometime it might be interesting to see who has the record for most offices or positions held. Is there anyone willing to volunteer to research this? Thanks to all.

Your Synod at Work

Board for Ministerial Education

According to the 2015 Book of Reports and Memorials for WELS, The "continuing scriptural purpose of our ministerial educations schools is the preparation of candidates for the public ministry of the gospel to proclaim Christ's love in the congregations, schools, and mission fields of our fellowship." The schools also include in their purpose "the continuing education of those who already serve in the ministry of the gospel."

A special emphasis of the last biennium has been to identify and strengthen the partnerships with all of the areas and groups in the WELS church body.

The Board for Ministerial Education "distributes subsidy to the ministerial educations schools from a block grant supplied by the Synodical Council. As a result, there are stable reserves and normal annual tuition increases for Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary and Martin Luther College. There are basically two working groups:

1. There is a working group on financial assistance that has the goal that no student is denied the ability to train for the ministry of the gospel because of financial reasons. Schools are developing their partnership with the Ministry of Christian Giving to be sure that financial assistance programs are adequately supported.

2. There is a working group on programmed maintenance to address capital needs on our campuses. This working group is re-evaluating the effectiveness of the formula it uses for the allocation of programmed maintenance funding to individual schools. Capital campaigns at the schools are conducted in coordination with the Ministry of Christian Giving, reviewed and adopted as a regular part of the synod budget process.

Also, over the last biennium, the ministerial education schools have put considerable effort into partnerships with the Conference of Presidents and the Congregation and Ministry Support Group to expand current efforts in the continuing education of called workers.

As the Book of Reports and Memorials states, "we give thanks to God who continues to supply our synod with young men and women who willing to serve anywhere that the church needs them, who believe that the Bible is the infallible Word of God, and who treasure the precious Lutheran heritage of the unconditional gospel."

Christmas Break

School will resume on Monday, January 4th. The end of the 2nd Quarter will be Friday, January 15 with report cards going home the following Friday. There will be no school on Monday, January 18. The faculty will be having an In-Service - The first half of a Math Curriculum Work Day at MLC with other schools in the area. The last half will be on February 15th.

SPLS Building Committee

The St. Paul's Building Committee has continued to meet to determine the goals of adding space to the school as well as refurbishing the original school building. They have also met with the architects to draw plans to match the desires of the congregational vote in early December. The SP Voters were in favor of only borrowing once for the project, so the initial Entrance/ Handicapped Bathrooms/Elevator cost of \$2.5 million would need to be raised to complete that phase without borrowing. There was discussion of combining the Entrance/Early Childhood Wing into a first phase, so the architect is drawing that at this time. There was also some discussion of replacing present windows in the school due to their lack of efficiency. There are still many unknowns but details are becoming more focused as discussions and additional preliminary drawings are made.

Lifetouch will be taking pictures on Friday, January 29th at school. These would be more formal portrait type pictures. Lifetouch encourages all students to have pictures taken, yet there is no obligation to purchase. Families will be able to choose to order once the pictures are printed. Families can return unwanted pictures.
