#### The Believer and the Resurrection

Matthew 28:5-10 The angel said to the women, "Do not be afraid, for I know that you are looking for Jesus, who was crucified. <sup>6</sup>He is not here; he has risen, just as he said. Come and see the place where he lay. <sup>7</sup>Then go quickly and tell his disciples: 'He has risen from the dead and is going ahead of you into Galilee. There you will see him.' Now I have told you." <sup>8</sup>So the women hurried away from the tomb, afraid yet filled with joy, and ran to tell his disciples. <sup>9</sup>Suddenly Jesus met them. "Greetings," he said. They came to him, clasped his feet and worshiped him. <sup>10</sup>Then Jesus said to them, "Do not be afraid. Go and tell my brothers to go to Galilee; there they will see me."

Try to place yourself in the sandals of the women who first came to the tomb on the morning of the Resurrection. The stone had been rolled away, two angels were there to greet them, and the body of Jesus was no longer there. We do not have to guess at their reaction. The Bible tells us that they were "afraid yet filled with joy." They were filled with fear and joy at the same time.

The fear they experienced was godly fear. They stood in complete awe of God, standing in the presence of his holiness, realizing they were sinful people on whom the sovereign Lord had shown mercy, and on whom he had imparted the blessings of the forgiveness of sins and eternal life. The empty tomb could mean nothing less than that God had kept his promise. His Son, the Messiah, had redeemed them as he promised. In this act of God, the Resurrection, he fulfilled his words through the psalmist: **Psalm 130:3-4 If you, O LORD, kept a record of sins, O Lord, who could stand?** <sup>4</sup> **But with you there is forgiveness; therefore you are <u>feared.</u> Yes, we would have expected the psalmist to say, "but there is forgiveness with you, therefore you are praised!" Or, "... therefore we give you thanks!" But that is not what he says. "With you there is forgiveness, therefore you are** *feared***. God is feared because we are brought to the realization that this is the Creator and Judge of all, and that he is now pardoning us, weak and undeserving though we are. We stand in complete awe and wonder of his grace. It is no wonder that Solomon, twelve times over in the book of Proverbs, refers to the fear of the LORD and also reminds us that it is the beginning of wisdom.** 

But coupled with fear was also joy. For the women who came to the tomb that morning there was joy, complete joy. Jesus had risen! He fulfilled his promises, as the angels were quick to remind the women. The women were overjoyed, not simply because they were told Jesus was still alive, but more than that, he had risen from death! His resurrection also meant life and resurrection for all who believed on his name. It meant their sins were forgiven. It meant they had peace with God. It meant eternal life in heaven.

May that also be our reaction as we leave the empty tomb and walk onward through this earthly life as pilgrims who make our way through this world. Look back at the empty tomb, and thus fix your hearts and eyes heavenward, knowing that our hope and comfort is found in the risen Christ. We are filled with fear and at the same time joy because Jesus Christ is risen from death. The Easter experience is something we carry with us throughout the year and are reminded that because Jesus lives, we too shall live.

## Our Synod at Work

#### WELS ANNUAL REPORT: CALLED TO PROCLAIM

As mentioned in our last column, we are going to be focusing during the next few months on the WELS Annual Report to Members/2018. This month we are going to be highlighting information that is contained in the section "Called to Proclaim." This section talks about our World Missions and our Home Missions.

World Missions is reaching out with the saving message of the gospel in 50 countries. That number continues to grow due to exploratory evangelism in new mission fields and an increased online media presence. World Missions plants churches, trains national pastors, and mentors fellow Lutheran Christians. Here are some interesting facts about World Missions:

They are celebrating 125 years of mission work in 2018 and are in fellowship with 105,465 Lutherans around the world.

They have 44 missionaries in the field conducting outreach and training national pastors.

They support 13 teachers and more than 60 laypeople as they reach out to children and adults with the gospel.

They are exploring outreach opportunities in 14 prospective new mission fields and are reaching more than 840,000 people in Latin America with the gospel through the Academia Cristo Facebook page.

They continue to partner with Multi-Language Publications, which has printed more than 2.9 million items in more than 52 languages.

Home Missions is called to proclaim God's Word to those in the United States and English-speaking North America. It also supports campus ministry, cross-cultural ministries, and a variety of other mission activities. In 2017, the Board for Home Missions authorized four new mission starts and three ministry enhancements:

Shepherd of the Valley in Westminster, CO. has started a second campus in a growing western suburb of Denver after a year's work of evangelism and outreach.

Living Savior in Asheville, NC, started a daughter congregation in Hendersonville, NC, which started worship services with more than 100 in attendance.

Living Hope Lutheran Church is in Chattanooga, TN. The church was started in May, 2017, and has been blessed with strong success in initial outreach efforts.

Grace in Charlotte, NC is the mother congregation helping a church in Huntersville get started with 20 core members providing support.

Mt. Lebanon in Milwaukee, WI., is currently calling a second pastor to allow the campus pastor more time to spend with prospective families.

A second bilingual pastor was called to Immanuel in Waukegan, IL, to enhance its Hispanic ministry.

New lay members have allowed King of Kings in Little Rock, AR. to restart with a full-time pastor at the helm. The surrounding community is growing and Lord-willing, so too, will the ministry.

Next month we will continue to review the 2018 Annual Report.

## **Council Digest**

The Church Council met on March 20. With a number of individuals missing because of illness and scheduling conflicts, an abbreviated agenda was addressed. A summary of reports and action from the meeting not reported elsewhere in the *Fortress* follows:

Rev. Robert Guenther continues to consider a call to serve as administrative associate pastor at St. John's. Pastor Guenther currently serves Grace Lutheran Church in Kenai, Alaska. He and his wife Rebecca are the parents of four children, ages 14, 12, 7 and 5. A decision is anticipated shortly after Easter.

After sorting through a number of complications and various options, the council reiterated its decision to purchase the 601 S. Washington Street property from a member family of St. John's at a price not to exceed \$115,900. The purchase of the home meets the long term goals of our master site plan as a space for additional parking. In the short term, the home can serve as a location for additional Sunday school rooms or a transitional parsonage for a second pastor. Special gifts of almost \$20,000 for the project have been received and will be applied directly to the purchase of the home along with internal funds made available for that purpose. No borrowing of funds will be necessary. Completion of the sale is anticipated within the next month.

Administrative Teacher James Dretske is currently disabled because of a back condition. Since his return to the classroom this school year is uncertain,

the Board of Elders, which traditionally serves our congregation as a called worker care committee, was asked to make sure his family's needs are being addressed during the time of the disability. Please pray that God would restore Mr. Dretske's health and allow him to return to the classroom in the near future.

Gerald Woodley has been appointed as lay delegate from St. John's to the Minnesota District Convention on June 12-14 at Martin Luther College. We thank Mr. Woodley for serving our congregation and district by attending those meetings on our behalf.

The Board of Youth and Education reported that it is planning a 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary in ministry recognition for Teacher Laura Balza on Sunday, May 27. Details will be announced as plans are finalized.

The audit committee of Wayne Wels and Jason Enter examined the congregation's financial records found everything to be in good order. The council voted to accept the report and its accompanying recommendations. The report will be shared with the voters' assembly in April for approval. We thank Messrs. Wels and Enter for their volunteer efforts.

The next Church Council meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, April 17, at 7:00 p.m. The next quarterly voters' meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, April 24, at 7:00 p.m.

#### Miscellany

This month's article again recalls items from service bulletins, newsletters, and council and congregational minutes from 60, 50, 25, 10, and 1 years ago. Hope you will find them interesting. Comments, questions, suggestions and corrections are welcome at kruegerh@mlc-wels.edu.

**1958, Pastor was Rollin Reim.** In February, nineteen teams of two took the 1957 Yearbook to the homes of members to discuss it with them "in order more perfectly to unify our interests and efforts in Christ's name."

**1968, Pastor was Frederick Nitz.** The 1968 Year Book includes a detailed report on the 1968 St. John's Dartball team. Interest regarding forming a St. John's softball team was solicited in June.

1993, Pastor was David Kolander; David Zabel was Director of Christian Education. Communion procedure was changed and discussed during the year. It was decided to celebrate communion in both services and using both individual and common cups and serving at the floor level to avoid making communicants walk up the steps to the altar. A rail was constructed and new communion ware was purchased.

**2008, Pastors were Jeffrey Bovee and Wayne Laitinen; Administrative Teacher was James Dretske.** In connection with the 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary the March Fortress noted some significant items from 1947-48. St. John's began with a resolution of St. Paul's: "St. Paul's congregation favors the founding of another congregation of the Wisconsin Synod in our city." Prof. Martin Albrecht of Dr. Martin Luther College served as a temporary pastor. The first service was held in St. Paul's School on October 19, 1947 with 81 in attendance. The present property was purchased soon after and groundbreaking was held on May 19, 1948.

**2017, Pastor was Jeffrey Bovee; Administrative Teacher was James Dretske.** Staff minister Michael Martens, a native of New Ulm, began serving his internship at St. John's for the spring semester.
